What do car guys do in a global pandemic? Why, they work on their cars, of course!

This is my first-person account of the perils of tearing into a 1929 Chevy coupe. Don't worry, there's no gore in this story. First, I'd like to walk you through the basics of auto repair/replace.

If you haven't worked on your car or any car, in a while, I'll share a few things you need to do, have and use. Wear old clothes, you will get dirty. If you are taking things apart, you'll need something to clean them in and someplace to put your parts. Pick up a small wash tub, a variety of brushes, most auto parts stores have a selection of brushes in a handy pack. Steel bristles for steel and hard material, copper for soft metals and aluminum bristles for delicate parts you don't want to marks with steel bristles. I found that used household containers like cottage cheese containers and almost anything plastic will work. I started using some degreaser from the parts store but found it to be toxic, flammable and generally not good for humans. I tried "409" cleaner, not bad but to my surprise, "WD40" worked best for my applications. I started to replace the brakes and clean up the car as a matter of pride of ownership. The tale of my brakes will turn your hair white. Back to taking things apart. If you are not 100% certain how it comes apart, take pictures BEFORE you turn that first nut or bolt. Cell phone or tablet are ideal, the tablet gets the win because it will give you a bigger image.

One thing I personally dislike is scrubbing nasty hands and fingernails. Many options are available, from scraping your nail on a bar of soap will help keep your nails in pretty good shape. My choice is to trim my nails as close as I can. Nothing hurts more than tearing a greasy fingernail. And the cleaning and bandaging is a real drag. If you go with trimmed nails you might want to get some disposable gloves, Smart & Final carries non latex food handler's gloves that will keep your hands clean. While you are in the store, look at the selection of brushes they have and maybe get a gallon of "409" and some green scouring pads for the messy jobs.

New tire & tire irons

I can't stress the importance of keeping your parts together. If you are working on the right front wheel, have a suitable container to put nuts, bolts and washers that belong to that wheel/brake. I have about a dozen plastic containers, all marked with the contents. Luckily, my car has running boards so I have a built-in shelf to hold different containers with clean parts. The lids from half gallon Ice creams are perfect for lug nuts and such. If you plan to paint your parts, have a dedicated painting area away from your car and other parts. Let the paint dry, don't rush. Since I am doing all four wheels and brakes, I can work on one wheel at a time and move from wheel to wheel. There is a method to my madness!



I'm going to take it as a given that you all have a basic tool box, end wrenches, ratchets and sockets, maybe air wrenches. I've got my old reliable red Craftsman compressor. They are nice but not necessary. While I'm talking tools, you may have to buy some for specialty jobs, I needed to get a slide hammer from Harbor Freight to remove the rear axle seals from the rear end housing. Now driving the new ones in was easy. I took the seal to my local hardware store and matched the seal to a plumbing fixture, added a 6" nipple and a coupler and shazam, I had a seal driver for \$8.00! And the plumbing pieces are reusable. I try to wipe off my tools and put them back when I'm finished with them. By all means, wipe and store your tools at the end of your work day. Nothing's more frustrating than walking into the garage in the morning and having to start looking for tools. Clean as you go is my best advice.



New brakes don't fit 😣

We all order parts, whether from "The Filling Station," or somewhere else, keep the box, packing materials and double check the packing list to ensure that you got what you paid for. If you need to return something, you have a box and packing material for free. It's always a thrill seeing the UPS man bringing you new toys. If you get parts you aren't ready to install, keep them in the box. The trunk is a great storeroom! To be clear, open your shipment to ensure accuracy and put the parts back in the box. That allows you to work around the new parts until you are ready for them. Mark the box's contents on the outside of the box.

I didn't mention safety glasses earlier, but they are a must have item. Just today I was cleaning some parts with my grinder when a wire came off the wheel and bounced off my safety glasses. If you are working under the car, think about a face shield. Nobody likes unknown stuff falling on one's face when you have both hands occupied on a task.



Clean brakes

Since we all have different cars of different years, this isn't really a "how to" story. It's just a few ideas for those of you into or getting into projects. A lot of this is pretty basic, but everyone's level of knowledge is different. I hope that these suggestions are helpful to the readers. Auto repair is work, in the hot weather, stay hydrated, have a snack on the work bench and be CAREFUL! Oh, and HAVE FUN!
