Chuck Noble's '54 update 4/17/21

This next week I will be working on the 54 Chevy. The rear end died after 67 years. Unable to find someone to rebuild the original one around here I decided to upgrade and am installing a S-10 373 rear end with Posi-traction and installing a S-10 5 speed transmission with overdrive. I have a couple friends here that build street rods that know how to do it correctly. I will have to have a drive shaft made and will need an adapter to mate the trans to the 6 cyl engine. Will also have to modify the clutch to mate with the new transmission. When finished it should

be a better driver and get better mileage. Should be able to have it on the road in time for a classic Car tour in June.



I was able to find parts for the old rear end but no one would touch it as it tied up their shops to long and very few have worked on a torque tube drive line. Also, to change the clutch I had to drop the rear end to remove the transmission to get to the clutch. With arthritis and bad back and heart I decided to upgrade to make it easier to work on. The 6cyl engine stays as it runs good and strong and is built up to around 155hp+ and will stay with traffic easily.

We are hoping to drive it to Ohio for a VCCA tour in July if we can still get in. Waiting to register until I know the car is ready for that long of a trip. I built it to drive and drive it we do, since moving here we have had it in Indiana, Tenn., Eastern KY in application mountains.

Chevrolet Trivia Answer

The last year that a straight axle front suspension was offered in Chevrolet cars was 1940 in the Master 85 series. From 1941 onward, independent suspensions were used exclusively on Chevrolet passenger cars.

GMC Trivia Answer

Starting in 1939, most GMC six cylinder engines have the cubic inch size stamped in as the first three numbers of the stamped engine serial number. The number is stamped on the machined boss near the fuel pump.
